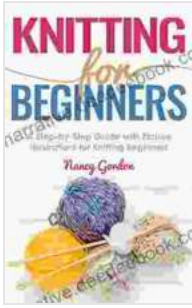
## Materials You'll Need:

## Knit Stitch

## **Purl Stitch**

## **Binding Off**

1. Knit two stitches: Knit the first two stitches on the left-hand needle. Knitting two stitches for binding off illustration]
2. Slip the first stitch over the second stitch: Use the left-hand needle to lift the first stitch over the second stitch and off the right-hand needle. Slipping the first stitch over the second stitch illustration]
3. Knit the next stitch: Knit the next stitch on the left-hand needle onto the right-hand needle. Knitting the next stitch for binding off illustration]
4. Repeat steps 2-3: Continue slipping one stitch over the previous stitch and knitting a new stitch until you have one stitch remaining on the right-hand needle. Continuing the binding off process illustration]
5. Cut the yarn and pull it through the last stitch: Cut the yarn, leaving a tail approximately 6 inches long. Thread the tail through the last stitch and pull it tight to close the bind-off. Cutting and pulling the yarn illustration]

## **Finishing**

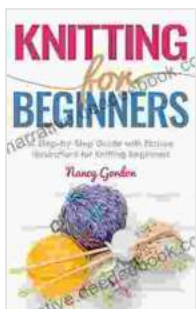
1. Weave in loose ends: Use the yarn needle to weave in any remaining loose ends with the tapestry needle to secure the knit fabric. Weaving in loose ends illustration]
